About ten days before it happened a man in his thirties turned up in a white transit van and asked Paul and Amanda Howell if they wanted to buy any memory foam mattresses. He approached them along the drive but stopped well short of the house and said that he didn't want to come any closer in case they had any dogs. Paul assured them he didn't.

It seems likely this was an instance of 'casing the joint' as, apparently, he was looking around as he left.

camera and take a photo of them and make a note of the registration number of the van.



SUMMER THEFTS

We hope you've been making the most of the sun recently and have been able to enjoy your gardens.

We've probably all left windows and doors open to keep a breeze flowing through the house and give the place a bit of an airing. My guess is that most of us haven't even considered locking the front door while we're out in the back garden.

Recently the police have issued warnings that it's these kind of conditions that opportunist thieves are looking for. It only takes a few seconds for someone to slip through an open downstairs window and steal valuables from your house. Maybe even your car keys laying about.

Locking doors might be inconvenient, but not to a thief.

ROBBERS ARMED

Police are appealing for witnesses to an armed robbery in Spalding.

Police were called to Gate Farm, on Holbeach Road in the town, shortly after midday on Friday 12 July after three men entered the site office and sprayed a male member of staff with a substance similar to pepper spray. One of the offenders then assaulted him by hitting him with what appeared to be a gun, before taking a large amount of cash from the premises.

The staff member was treated by ambulance staff for the effects of the spray but did not go to hospital.

The three offenders are described as:

1. A white male, of slim build with short dark hair. He was wearing a dark coloured top with a yellow hood, blue jeans and dark shoes.
2. A white male of slim build with dark hair wearing a grey or black bomber-style jacket, white jogging bottoms and black footwear.
3. A white male wearing a dark top with a horizontal stripe across the middle, white baseball cap, dark bottoms and white trainers.

None of the offenders spoke during the incident.

Please beware that telephone calls are again being made to the Lincolnshire region regarding a PPI scam.

This is how it works: A member of the public receives a telephone call stating they are entitled to reclaim Payment Protection Insurance.

They are assured that they are entitled to the sum quoted and in order for the company to issue the repayment they need to obtain UKASH vouchers to pay the companies admin fee to release the full sum.

Please DO NOT make any payments to companies that haven't given written paper work or proof detailing the banks who are due to make the refund to you.

You are able to reclaim PPI yourself and do not need to pay any admin fees to third party organisations.

Summer has finally arrived in Fosdyke and hopefully will continue Son into August. If you do nothing else this month, remember to water your pots and water early enough in the day so plants can absorb the moisture before the hot sun dries the soil. Early watering also insures that the foliage dries before night. Wet foliage at night increases susceptibility to fungus diseases.

Now is the time to start thinking about autumn flowering bulbs. These are always worth considering, as the number of flowering plants at this time of the year is limited. The most popular are crocus and cyclamen, when buying choose plants that are in leaf and plant as soon as you can, somewhere with a bit of shade.

Aphids should cease to be a problem with your roses this month, but rose rust and black spot will thrive on undernourished plants, especially when the soil is dry. Spray and apply a rose feed that is applied directly onto the leaves (foliar feed).

Trim your ivy and conifer hedges now. It should be late enough that you won't disturb any nesting birds and early enough to avoid frost damage. I've seen a few hedges in Fosdyke with large brown areas where the frost has got in when the hedges have been

trimmed at the wrong time of the year.

If it is still hot and dry a shallow birdbath topped up with water would be much appreciated by our feathered friends.

My most important tip for August, in my opinion, is to enjoy your garden. Spend as much time in it as you can; have a barbecue, have your breakfast on the patio, play with the dog, laze under an umbrella. It's not all hard work in the garden and you should enjoy it when it is looking it's best.

Did I mention watering your pots?

THE LAST MAN OF BEDE

Denis Glenn's front-page piece on the Bede almshouses and the Sir Thomas Middlecott Charity in the July *Fosdyke Newsletter* prompted Mrs Lineham to send us some photos and information about the last person to live in the Bede cottages when they were still almshouses and some history stirred by the pictures.

Mrs Lineham says that the last person to live in Bede Row was an Irishman known as Ned Duffy, the man on the right in the photo, who used to frequent The Ship Inn when Fred Berrisford and his wife ran the pub before they moved to Canada.

Ned used to play dominos but was a notorious cheat. Apparently he had a bit of a gammy hand and used to hide the double six under his bent fingers, knock on the table and say he was out! Mrs Lineham says he was a really nice chap though and a great laugh - a real Irishman and well liked by the whole village.

When Ned died he had no family in the village, or any money, just lots of friends, so the villagers clubbed together, and with the help of Fred and his wife from The Ship Inn, arranged a whip round to pay for his funeral - that's how well he was thought of.

Mrs Lineham has been in the village for about fifty years having moved here from Boston. Yet she

remembers it was quite a while before any of the villagers started talking to her; she was considered an outsider for ages. People are far more transient these days though and thankfully most of the villagers are really friendly and new people are welcomed rather than made to feel alien - but a little effort is needed on both sides.

She remembers when Fosdyke was an inshore fishing port and port

for coastal boats loading wheat and corn. In fact she remembers one of the boats being called the *Fosdyke Trader!* The photo showing the Welland frozen over in 1962-63 also shows the grain store of Lawes Manures. The winter had come early and the fishing smacks, as the fishing boats were called, were put into the creek because of the ice. They were made of wood in those days, not steel, and the last wooden fishing boat, the *Terence G*, was owned by Harry Lineham and his sons John and Tony.

In those days the fishing families were: The Smith brothers, Charlie - known as Barry - Sammy, and Herbert - known as Docker; the Lineham brothers and their sons; and the Bryant brothers. While all that has gone Mrs Lineham reckons that Dave Parkinson has done a great job to turn the quay into the Fosdyke Marina and it's kept alive at least a part of Fosdykes heritage. It would have been a shame for the village to lose that link with the sea. And, of course, you can still book yourself on one of the cruises that run out of Boston - check out the advert on Page 1.

During that bad winter a coastal boat was frozen into the ice at Fosdyke and Mrs Lineham remembers the crew walking across the river to The Ship and it wasn't until the middle of February 1963 that the weather started to break.

Anyone else with memories to share?



Our fight to beat vandals

FOSDYKE turned out in force on Sunday for the annual village gala.

Kicked off at 2pm on Puttock Gate playing field, the fun included a tug-of-war, fancy dress contest, car boot sale, six-a-side football, barbecue, bar, soft refreshments, stalls and many more attractions.

The event was organised by the village playing field committee, which each year works hard to raise funds to provide Fosdyke with a clubhouse on the playing field. Committee chairman Mr Jim Gott said the fund raising had been going on for more than 10 years.

So far they've managed to buy the playing field and put a portable building on it along with a wooden structure that will become the club house.

But the committee's efforts have been an uphill struggle

against vandalism, which Mr Gott said had fortunately tailed off a little in the last few weeks.

He said: "If it had kept going on the playing field committee would have packed up. After all the work that was going on we were just getting things smashed up as soon as we got them there."

Lawn mowers were bought to keep the field trim and tidy, but within a day of being stored on the site, they fell prey to vandals.

Toilets installed for people using the field were also broken and had to be removed.

"I go down to the field quite a lot and I am trying to catch people out. I can never catch anyone but that is the only way we can get a private prosecution. It is just how things have gone these last few years," said Mr Gott.

"It starts at home. Nobody is

kept in order as they should be. You get a fair bit of lip down there. If I was their age and a grown up came down I would have been running."

But despite the struggle to provide villagers with better facilities, Mr Gott was confident they would reach their goal.

The portable building has been in place for almost five years and last Spring the wooden structure was installed - it had a baptism of fire when vandals tried to burn it down within days of its installation.

Once finished, the club house will boast toilets, changing rooms, a new roof and floor and bar.

Mr Gott said several thousand pounds would probably be needed to complete the renovation - last year they raised between £700 and £800.

RESPECT AND TRUST

As I write this, I've just returned from General Synod where we were discussing the ordination of women as bishops. Whilst everyone agrees it will happen, there remain major differences about exactly how to enable the move. During the debate, I was very impressed with the nature and quality of the contributions from people who disagreed so profoundly about something.

Being able to disagree honestly about something is very important – as Voltaire said, “I disagree with what you have to say, but I'll defend to the death your right to say it.” The concept of free speech is one that underpins democracy.

I came across these words from St Augustine of Hippo recently, carved in beautiful calligraphy on the floor of a chapel:

‘We come to God not by navigation, but by love’.

It seems to me these words have something to say to us about how we handle disagreements in general, not just in the church. Rather than being angry and looking for someone or something to blame when something goes wrong, we would do better to look for God's providence.

Of course God allows things to go wrong and for human beings to make mistakes, but the grace of God is always available for us to discover his will for the future. For me this means changing the language of our discourse from one of suspicion and mistrust to one of mutual respect and trust.

To use Augustine's metaphor, the method of plotting an accurate course across the ocean which we initiate and in which we are in control is not God's way. Instead God invites us to respond to his love by building new relationships characterised by mutual respect and trust.

This is not easy, but it is a path worth taking. If we can listen and understand views of those with whom we disagree, we can humbly explore the way God is calling us to walk.
